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Introduction

DJAM is a private school for Jazz and Popular Music founded in 1990.

DJAM offers a multi-year course in which theory and practical subjects are carefully coordinated. Our teachers are experienced, motivated and work closely together to support students as effectively as possible.

Students can choose from three different course packages with, optionally supplemented with individual main subject lessons. Through an entrance exam determines the level for each subject, after which students are assigned to appropriate groups.

We work with small class sizes, allowing for plenty of personal attention. There is an atmosphere of enthusiasm, dedication, focus, and mutual support. DJAM also provides excellent preparation for conservatory studies, both in practical skills and theoretical knowledge.

DJAM is more than just a school – it's also a meeting place where students come together to make music, rehearse, and grow. Like any serious musician, the program continues to evolve and innovate.

Concept

The educational concept was developed by Christian Hassenstein, in collaboration with teachers from various Dutch conservatories.

The program focuses on developing musical knowledge and skills, with a strong emphasis on improvisation. Individual aspects such as instrumental technique, theory, and ear training are central. In group lessons, we focus on listening, ensemble playing, and building a repertoire. The goal is to help students take a significant step forward in their musical development.

Thanks to this unique approach and the well-integrated curriculum, DJAM has earned a distinctive place within music education in the Netherlands.

Our Students

Our students have different backgrounds and goals in music. There are professional musicians, as well as people for whom music is an (extremely important) pastime. Some already have Classical training and want to develop their skills in Jazz. Others have only been playing for half a year or so and have certain ambitions they want to fulfill in music. Some want to study at a conservatory and choose DJAM as a preparatory training. Others choose to study at DJAM on a long-term basis because of its character, atmosphere and quality. The age of the students ranges from 16 to 66.

"Does it work, having so many different kinds of people studying together?" Yes, it works. It happens to work very well.

The Polanentheater

DJAM is located in the Polanentheater, in the Westerpark district of Amsterdam.



The building houses several classrooms:

- One for combo lessons
- One for supporting subjects
- A larger hall for Additional Practical Modules (APM)

In addition, the foyer of the theater is open to DJAM students during lesson times. It's a relaxed and welcoming space where you can grab a coffee or tea, chat with fellow students, or dive into a bit of music theory between classes.

**Ilse Huizinga**


(Born in 1966)

DJAM Course Packages – Choose the Package That Suits You

At DJAM, you can choose from three different course packages depending on your musical goals, level, and availability. You also have the option to add main subject lessons. Below is a clear overview of each package.

Package 1 – Complete Study Program (excluding main subject lessons)

Recommended for most students

This package offers the full range of DJAM group courses, excluding the main subject lesson. It includes theory, ear training, rhythm, improvisation, APM, and combo classes. Since these subjects are designed to complement each other, this package provides the most cohesive and effective study experience.

- **Weekly lesson hours:** 4 to 5 hours
- **Estimated homework load:** approx. 10 to 15 hours/week

We recommend Package 1 to most students. In specific cases—like limited time or very focused learning goals – another package might be more suitable.

Package 2 – Theory & Supporting Subjects Only

Ideal for strengthening your musical foundation

This package includes only the theoretical subjects: music theory, ear training, rhythm, improvisation, and APM. It's designed for students who want to deepen their musical knowledge without focusing heavily on practical ensemble work.

- **Weekly lesson hours:** 1.5 to 2.5 hours
- **Estimated homework load:** approx. 5 to 10 hours/week

Package 3 – Combo Lessons Only

For developing your practical skills

This package is for students with a solid foundation in theory and ear training who want to focus on playing in an ensemble. You'll only follow combo classes, applying your knowledge in a practical setting.

- **Weekly lesson hours:** 1.5 to 3 hours
- **Estimated homework load:** approx. 5 to 10 hours/week



Additional Info

- Combo placement priority is given to students enrolled in Package I, due to limited spots.
- Main subject lessons are not included in any package and must be booked separately. They're strongly recommended for their one-on-one guidance and personalized development (see below).
- Homework time depends on your pace, experience, and study efficiency.

Main Subject Lessons

At DJAM, you have the option to take individual weekly lessons (45 minutes) focused on your primary instrument or voice.

Always the Right Teacher

You'll find a list of our teachers under The DJAM Team. Don't see your instrument listed? No problem – DJAM will find a suitable and qualified teacher for you, even if you play a less common instrument. We aim to make main subject lessons available to everyone.

Why Take Main Subject Lessons Through DJAM?

Main subject lessons are a valuable addition to your DJAM studies. They align closely with your group and combo classes. Often, you'll work on the same repertoire in both, creating a seamless and efficient learning process. Benefits include:

- More focused and goal-oriented practice
- Stronger individual performance and ensemble contribution
- Easier and more effective combo preparation

DJAM recommends arranging your main subject lessons through the school. This ensures high-quality instruction by certified teachers who understand the DJAM curriculum inside and out.

How Much Practice Time Will You Need?

It's hard to estimate exactly, as it varies by student. Your chosen package, your learning style, and your efficiency all play a role.

However, because main subject and combo lessons often overlap in content, progress in one will reinforce the other. Practicing for your main subject class usually also prepares you for combo – and vice versa.

Costs & Placement

Main subject lessons are optional and billed separately from your course package. You'll find the pricing under The Financial Side of this brochure.

Please note: Students who arrange their main subject lessons through DJAM are given priority in placement.

DJAM Courses – Your Musical Growth Step by Step

At DJAM, you'll follow a wide range of subjects designed to build both practical skills and theoretical depth. This balanced approach is at the heart of our program and supports your musical development – whether you're just starting out or already at an advanced level.

Combo Class – Making Music Together

Once a week | Duration: 90–180 minutes (depending on level)

Combo lessons are the core of DJAM's curriculum. This is where everything comes together – improvisation, playing as a group, listening, and musical interaction. In a small ensemble, you'll work on jazz standards and specially composed pieces tailored to your level.

We aim for a unique lineup in each combo, avoiding duplicate instruments (drums and bass are never doubled).

In combo you'll learn to:

- Play and improvise as a group
- Actively listen and adapt to others
- Rehearse songs and arrangements
- Receive and apply constructive feedback

To participate, your technical ability must be sufficient to keep up. If not, we recommend starting with main subject lessons, possibly combined with supporting subject (theory) classes.

Bonus:

- Practice with play-along tracks at home
- Perform with your combo at the New Year's Concert and Open Day
- Take part in monthly combo presentations and jam sessions

Supporting Subjects – Strengthening Your Musical Foundation

These subjects help you understand how music works and make you a better communicator as a musician. You'll learn theory and immediately apply it to your instrument or voice.

Support I: The basic subjects (levels 1 through 3)

These five classes are interrelated and reinforce one another:

- *Music Theory (biweekly, 50 min)*

Learn scales, chords, key signatures, and—at higher levels—harmonic functions, voice leading, and chord analysis.

- *Improvisation (biweekly, 50 min)*

Develop solo phrasing, variation, and application of theory on your instrument or voice.

- *Rhythm Training (biweekly, 50 min)*

Build rhythmic understanding, timing, and swing. Practice performing, writing, and improvising rhythms.

- *Ear Training (biweekly, 50 min)*

Recognize and reproduce intervals, scales, chords, and melodies by ear.

Please note: A basic ability on piano or guitar is recommended for this module.

- APM (Applied Practical Modules) (weekly, 60 min)

A rotating set of practical topics, including:

- II-V-I progressions, solo & modal practice
- Big band, blues, guide-tone lines
- Jazz listening and history

The APM program spans three years, after which you'll have completed the full curriculum. Study materials and audio tracks are available via the student site.

Instrument requirement

You'll need access to a chordal instrument (keyboard, piano, or guitar). Don't play one yet? DJAM recommends purchasing a keyboard before your first class.

Reading music

Basic notation knowledge is expected. If needed, you can take the "Reading Music from Scratch" pre-course (3 lessons of 60 minutes), available in July, August, or September before the academic year begins.



Support 2: The extended subjects (advanced level)

Have you completed Level 1 and want to expand your creative toolkit? These courses will deepen your skills, with jazz as the foundation – though pop influences are welcome too.

- *Arranging (biweekly, 100 min)*

Learn how to arrange a melody for multiple instruments. Topics include instrumentation, harmonization, fills, and voice movement.

- *Composing (biweekly, 100 min)*

Structure original pieces within jazz or pop forms. You'll focus on chord progressions, melody, rhythm, form, and style.

Tip: Take Arranging first, then Composing – you'll be able to immediately arrange your own compositions!

Requirements for Support 2:

- Completed Music Theory Level 3 (or equivalent)
- Strong skills in ear training and rhythm (Level 2 or higher)
- Basic piano or guitar ability (able to play chords and melodies slowly)
- Familiarity with notation software (e.g., MuseScore, Sibelius, Finale, Dorico)

Main Subject Lesson – Personal Coaching on Your Instrument

Once a week | Duration: 45 minutes

Main subject lessons are private, one-on-one sessions focused on your specific instrument or voice. You'll work on technique, sound, expression, and interpretation. These lessons directly support your group classes – especially your combo work.

DJAM can arrange a suitable teacher for nearly any instrument. Even if you play something less common, we'll do our best to find a match.

Main subject lessons are optional but strongly recommended.

They are not included in the course packages and are billed separately.

Please note: Some courses or groups may only start if there are enough participants.

Level Placement and Admission at DJAM

Admission – Your Start at DJAM

Before you begin your studies, you will take an admission test. This test determines which level you will be placed in for each subject. DJAM uses four levels, aligned with your musical development. After the test, you will immediately receive both verbal and written feedback about which level you've been placed in.

If you find after a few lessons that the level is too high or too low, you can discuss this with your teacher. Changing levels is often possible.

Please note: There is a fee for the admission test (see page 23).

Progress Exam – Ready for the Next Level?

Each year, in May and June, you take an exam for nearly all subjects (except APM and your main subject). This exam determines whether you are ready to progress to the next level.

Everyone learns at their own pace. Sometimes you need a bit more time to complete a subject, simply because you may be more naturally inclined toward one subject than another. On top of that, we cover a large amount of material each year. As such, you may need two years to fully master all components of a particular level.

After the exam, you'll receive a report with your results and tips.

Re-exam – One More Chance

Did you miss your progress exam, or are you not satisfied with your level? Then you can take a re-exam, which is held around the same time as the admission tests. You may retake a maximum of two subjects per session.

Have you taken a break from studying for a year? Then you will need to take an exam again to rejoin the program.

Note: There is also a fee for this (see page 23).

Admission and Course Registration

Admission tests are held from June through November. Everyone is welcome to apply. Since spots are limited, we recommend doing the test as early as possible. This also makes it easier for us to take your preferred lesson days and times into account.

Who Is Admitted?

We look at your musical potential. You don't need to have specific skills or theoretical knowledge. Thanks to our level system, we can appropriately place everyone – from beginners to advanced students.

Motivation is also important: group lessons require flexibility and cooperation.



The Admission Test Has Two Parts:

1. Theory (45 minutes, group-based)

You take a written test with questions about music theory. The test starts easy and gets progressively more difficult. You only answer the questions you are able to.

2. Practical (45 minutes, individual)

You play two or three favorite jazz standards (or other music you can play) for a teacher. Then we assess your improvisation, ear, and rhythmic feel, adjusted to your level.

Don't worry about nerves. You don't need to give a perfect performance – the goal is to find the level that suits you best.

After Admission

If you are admitted, you will receive a registration form. This serves as a contract for one course year.

Want to join? Then return the completed and signed form and accept the accompanying terms.

Class Times and Lesson Days at DJAM

Course Year 2026/27

The course year starts with the schedule pickup day on Sunday, 20 September 2026. The first lessons begin one week later, on Sunday, 27 September 2026. The year runs through to about June 2027, and consists of 30 weeks of instruction, with breaks in between. The Christmas break lasts two weeks.

When Are the Classes?

DJAM offers lessons on the following days and times:

- **Sunday and Monday:** approximately 11:00 to 22:30
- **Tuesday and Wednesday:** evenings only, approximately 18:00 to 22:30

You can usually take all your group lessons in a single day, for example on Sunday or Monday. However, it may sometimes be better to spread your lessons over two days, which can make it easier to absorb the material.

Options for Students Who Live Far Away or Work During the Day

Depending on your study package, there are two options:

1. Take all lessons on the weekend (Sunday)

Not all levels are available on weekends, but for levels 1 and 2, combo and in-depth lessons are definitely offered on Sunday. For other levels, forming weekend groups depends on the number of applicants and their preferences.

2. Take some lessons on weekday evenings

This is possible if you work during the day. Lessons take place from about 18:00 to 22:30.

Scheduling and Indicating Preferred Days

To match the schedule to your availability as closely as possible, we ask you to indicate your preferred lesson days when registering. You can choose from:

- **No preference**
- **Any three of the four available lesson days**
(Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday)
- **Only weekends and/or weekday evenings**
(for example, if you have a full-time job)

Indicating three preferred days helps us maintain scheduling flexibility. This does not mean you'll automatically have classes on all three days. If you give fewer than three options, it's more likely that the schedule won't align fully with your wishes.

Please note: It is not helpful to specify parts of the day or exact times – only indicate the days you are available.

Schedule and Changes

You can pick up your schedule at the end of September. Since the schedule is created based on the preferences submitted, changes afterward are usually not possible. Only in exceptional cases can adjustments be made, and then a € 25,- administration fee applies.

If we're unable to accommodate your preferences, we'll get in touch to work out a solution together.

Rules of the Game

To ensure a good atmosphere and effective study conditions, DJAM has established a few rules. These concern:

- Being on time and well-prepared
- Treating fellow students, teachers, and staff with respect
- Paying on time
- Not causing disruptions

You'll receive the full rules along with the registration form after your admission test. We expect you to read and accept them as long as you are a DJAM student.

What Can You Do with DJAM?

DJAM Diplomas

After successfully completing the In-depth Subjects at Level 3 (Support 1), the Advanced Level (Support 2), and/or the Advanced Combo Level, you'll receive a DJAM diploma. This diploma lists all subjects you have completed with us. With this diploma, we demonstrate that you have developed musically to the point of being able to play independently at a high level.

Study and Further Opportunities

While we cannot guarantee admission into other programs, we do want to mention one important next step:

Conservatory Studies

If you want to apply to a conservatory, you will usually have the musical foundation you need after successfully completing Level 2 at DJAM.

The most important part of a conservatory admission is your playing level on your main instrument. At DJAM, you will receive excellent guidance from a teacher who helps you grow on your instrument.

Keep in mind: Admission requirements vary per conservatory. Some schools are more selective than others. The number of students admitted can also vary from year to year due to factors such as mergers, budget cuts, or new government regulations.

Tuition Fees and Payment Information

What does it cost?

The tuition fee depends on the study package you choose and your level. Below is a summary of the prices (for the full overview see page 13 in the brochure):

Payment Options

You can pay the tuition fee in two ways:

1. **In full** before 1 August 2026, by cash or bank transfer.
2. **In installments** (only for students living in the Netherlands). This involves extra administrative costs. Installments must be paid by:
 - 1 August 2026
 - 1 November 2026
 - 10 January 2027
 - 1 March 2027

DJAM may ask for proof of residence, such as a bank statement or extract from the population register.

Discounts and Late Registration

- Students continuing their studies at DJAM receive a discount on tuition fees.
- This discount does not apply to students taking only main instrument lessons.
- If you register just before or during the course, tuition must be paid within 14 days.
- For late registration and installment payments, DJAM will make specific arrangements with you.



Important Payment Rules

- Please pay on time. DJAM does not send payment slips but will send reminders before the due date.
- Pay on time to avoid extra administrative costs or further actions, such as involving a debt collection agency.
- Always clearly state your name when paying, even if someone else pays for you.
- Cash payments are preferred at the office. Teachers usually cannot accept payments.
- If you temporarily have trouble paying, contact the DJAM administration as soon as possible.

Child Benefit and Study Grants

- Studying at DJAM usually does not affect your right to child benefits.
- For questions about child benefits, contact the Social Insurance Bank (SVB).
- DJAM studies do not qualify for a study grant from the Ministry of Education or for an OV (public transport) annual pass.
- If you receive social benefits, we recommend taking lessons in the evening or on weekends, as this fits better with the requirements of benefit agencies.

Main Subject Lesson Fees

- If you take group lessons, main instrument lessons cost an extra € 1070,- (not included in the package price).
- If you take only main instrument lessons, the cost is € 1210,-.
- You pay this amount directly to your main instrument teacher, not to DJAM.
- A separate agreement is made for 30 main instrument lessons per course year.
- Payment can be made in one go or in installments (installment payments cost extra).

Admission and Re-exam Fees

- Admission costs are € 39,-, payable at registration.
- For late registration, payment can also be made on site (cash, exact amount preferred).
- Re-exams cost € 39,- each.
- You can register online via www.djam.nl or with the form at the back of the brochure (use this only if online registration does not work).
- Cancellation is possible up to 2 weeks before the start; after that no refund is possible.

Cost of Study Materials

Each study package includes mandatory study materials, which are given out at the start of the course year and must be paid for within 14 days. Here is an overview of the costs:


